We need to know our own threshold for success and recognize when we are close to it. When we model skills for managing our stress, we also teach our students how to manage their own stress.

I invite all of you to join me at our fall conference and discover even more suggestions for practicing teacher self care. I hope to see you there.

2019 Conference Roundtable Discussions

- **The Purpose of Discipline** led by Riina Hirsch. Riina will cover classroom rules versus procedures, the goal of discipline, and student self-regulation.



Alice Forgot

Amanda Robins recommends Turtles All the Way Down by John Green. This novel follows Aza who suffers from severe Obsessive Compulsive Disorder as she tries to solve a missing person mystery. She is a relatable character and the book's treatment of mental illness is interesting, complex, and nuanced. An autographed copy will be available as a conference door prize!

Chris Warren suggests Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate. One of Chris's goals in retirement is to read a book a week! Of all the books she read this summer, this is her favorite. It is a bittersweet story based on the real Memphis Tennessee Children's Home Society. This intriguing mystery alternates between the present and the 1930's.

Rilee Jones would like to recommend What Alice Forgot by Liane Moriarty. This novel is a page-turner that Rilee could not put down. She refers to it as, "the best book I have read in awhile."

Misty Everett recommends Workshopping the Canon by Mary E. Styslinger. This book, published by NCTE, introduces ELA teachers to a process for planning and teaching the most frequently taught texts in middle and secondary classrooms using a workshop approach. Demonstrating how to partner classic texts with a variety of high-interest genres within a reading and workshop structure, the author aligns the teaching of literature with what we have come to recognize as best practices in the teaching of literacy.



CRAWDADS Myriah Miller is endorsing Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens. This novel follows two timelines that slowly DELIA OWERS intertwine as it tells the story of Kya Clark, the so-called Marsh Girl. Myriah calls this book brilliant and unforgettable.
